1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Dynamic Active Energy Evolution ETF.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

### Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund seeks to provide long-term capital appreciation and income primarily through investment in a diversified portfolio of companies involved in renewable energy or related activities from around the globe.

In seeking to achieve its investment objectives, the Fund invests primarily in equity securities of companies involved in renewable energy or related activities, with no geographic constraint. These broadly defined businesses are involved in renewable power, emerging solutions and new energy innovators.

### Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund during the period that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

### Results of Operations

For the year ended at December 31, 2023 (the "period"), the Fund generated a total return of -5.2%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses.

The Fund's broad-based benchmark, the MSCI World Index (C\$), returned 20.8% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to this broad-based index to help you understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the index shown.

The Fund's blended benchmark, 50% S&P Global Clean Energy Index (C\$) and 50% MSCI World Index (C\$), returned -3.3% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

Consistent with the Fund's investment strategies, it invests primarily in equity securities of companies involved in renewable energy or related activities, with no geographic constraint. These broadly defined businesses are involved in:

**Renewable Power:** Energy generation, transmission, storage and distribution through primarily renewable-based sources including, but not limited to, wind and solar power, hydroelectricity, geothermal, biofuels, and uranium. **Emerging Solutions:** Development and deployment of emerging renewable energy solutions such as hydrogen, fuel cells, battery storage, lithium, rare earths, and other new energy fuels. **New Energy Innovators:** Supporting industries including, but not limited to, those involved in providing electrical parts and components, industrial gases, mining of essential input metals, infrastructure, technology, emissions reduction, sustainable finance and logistics support.

Global equities advanced over the 12-month period as the MSCI World Index (C\$) returned 20.8%. This time last year, U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) Chairman Powell stated the Fed would stay the course 'with interest rate hikes 'until the job [was] done.' While inflation was slowing, it was still elevated over 6%. Amid the uncertainty, a record number of CEOs said they expected a U.S. recession in 2023. Following that came bank stress, the debt ceiling and more geopolitical turmoil.

Today, inflation across the developed world has since more than halved, all the while growth has remained resilient and the recession many fretted over never happened.

Market sentiment was even more unpredictable than normal over 2023, bouncing from recession worries at the start of the year, to resilient growth over the summer, to higher for longer in the autumn, and ending the year focused on future rate cuts. The final quarter of 2023 delivered a welcome Christmas present for investors. A series of softer inflation numbers in the U.S. and Europe, shifted investor expectations to expect pre-emptive cuts from the central banks sooner in 2024 than previously expected resulted in an 'almost everything rally'. The MSCI World Index (C\$) returned 9.1% in the fourth quarter.

Ten of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period, with Information Technology, Communication Services and Consumer Discretionary being the largest contributors to index returns. The worst performing sectors were Utilities, Consumer Staples and Health Care.

In contrast with the global equity market, Clean Energy stocks were broadly down with the S&P Global Clean Energy Index (C\$) tumbling over 20%. This underperformance largely stemmed from performance in sectors such as Information Technology and Industrials, where sectors focused on solar, wind, hydrogen and battery storage led to underperformance in these sectors relative to broader equity markets. Utilities, another major component of the Clean Energy index, also underperformed the broader sector as renewable power utilities generally underperformed.

The Fund underperformed its blended benchmark over the period. The largest source of underperformance was security selection within Utilities, where renewable energy companies underperformed. The portfolio's zero weight allocation to Communication Services and Consumer Discretionary was also a relative detractor. Given the Fund's mandate to focus on clean energy companies and related industries, these sectors aren't a focus of the mandate.

Performance within all sectors was mixed, with widely divergent performance between best and worst performers in each segment. This resulted from idiosyncratic, stock specific fundamental developments (e.g., self-sustaining versus externally financed within renewable power developers, residential versus utility scale solar in emerging solutions, lithium versus uranium in mining), as well as timing to investments made within the year.

The positive contributors to performance in 2023 were uranium and copper mining, industrial gasses and hydrogen, U.S. and European industrial electrification component manufacturers, U.S. domestic solar manufacturing and utility scale solar component suppliers, semi-conductors, and certain Canadian and International utilities, renewable and nuclear power developers and generators.

The detractors from performance in 2023 were biofuels, lithium mining, residential solar, hydrogen fuel cells and battery storage, and many renewable power developers

The Fund's net asset value decreased to approximately \$2.1 million at December 31, 2023, from \$11.3 million at December 31, 2022. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$8.4 million, investment performance of -\$0.7 million and cash distributions of \$0.1 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

The Fund may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

## Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or likely to materially affect the Fund.

## Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia (“Scotiabank”). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a “related party”). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm’s length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

### Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. The Fund pays the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the “Management Fee” section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of the Fund, accrued and calculated daily and paid monthly.

### Operating Expenses

The Fund is responsible for fees and expenses incurred in complying with NI 81-107, including the fees payable and expenses reimbursed to members of the Independent Review Committee, brokerage expenses and commissions, fees relating to the usage of derivatives, income tax, harmonized sales tax (“HST”), withholding and other taxes.

Apart from the initial organizational costs of the Fund, all expenses related to the issuance of units of the Fund shall be borne by the Fund unless otherwise waived or reimbursed by the Manager. Further details about the Fund’s operating expenses can be found in the Fund’s most recent prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of the Fund’s operating expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

### Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be

sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;

- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without

taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

## Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of the Fund, accrued and calculated daily and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

## Index Descriptions

S&P Global Clean Energy Index (C\$) – This index is designed to measure the performance of companies in global clean energy-related businesses from both developed and emerging markets, with a target constituent count of 100.

MSCI World Index (C\$) – This is a free float-adjusted market capitalization index that is designed to measure global developed market equity performance.
