The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per share" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per share" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to shareholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund seeks to maximize returns and provide long-term capital growth consistent with preserving capital and providing income by investing primarily in a full range of U.S. equity and fixed income securities.

The total return of this Fund is derived through a combination of investments primarily in U.S. income-producing securities and growth oriented investments. The Fund generally follows a "focused" investment approach emphasizing a concentrated portfolio of 20 to 30 different businesses that meet required objectives. The portfolio advisor attempts to purchase investee businesses at a discount to their intrinsic value. Fixed income investments are selected based on a number of quality considerations. Investments may be eliminated when original attributes, including valuation parameters, are lost for whatever reason, in the opinion of the portfolio advisor.

All of the Fund's objectives and strategies are further described in the simplified prospectus of the Fund.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

Results of Operations

For the year ended at June 30, 2024 (the “period”), the Series A shares of the Fund generated a total return of 24.9%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund’s benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmarks, the S&P 500 Index (C\$) and the Bloomberg U.S. Government/Credit Index 1–5 yrs (C\$, Hedged), returned 28.7% and 1.9%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund’s mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund’s blended benchmark, 50% S&P 500 Index (C\$) and 50% ICE BofA U.S. Corporate & Government Master Index (C\$ Hedged), returned 14.7% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund outperformed the blended benchmark due in part to an overweight allocation and security selection in the Information Technology sector. An overweight allocation in the Financials sector and security selection in the Consumer Discretionary sector were also positive contributors to relative performance.

The U.S. equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 28.7%. As we witnessed equity markets generate double-digits returns, the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) surprisingly kept interest rates at bay (no change). The Federal Funds rate remained steady between 5.25% to 5.5%. This is a sharp contrast to the previous 24 months where the Fed raised rates at the fastest pace in 40 years in 2022 and 2023 to combat inflation that also rose to a four-decade high.

The Fed has taken a wait and see approach on reducing interest rates. The basis for this stance is that inflation remains stubbornly above the Fed’s 2% target inflation rate. As of May 31, 2024, the inflation rate came in at 3.3%. Over the preceding twelve months inflation has hovered within the 3.0% to 3.7% range.

The Fed is especially wary of cutting too soon after seeing an unexpected rise in inflation earlier this year from 3.1% in January to 3.5% in March. The Fed is trying to balance the risk of cutting rates too soon and allowing inflation to persist. This has left the Fed in something of a holding pattern, where policymakers are looking for several more months of benign inflation readings before deciding on cutting interest rates.

As interest rates remain at the highest levels since 2001, U.S. economic growth endures – steady hiring continues to fuel

consumer spending and, in turn, an economic expansion unlike any the U.S. has seen. Employers added 2.75 million jobs over the last 12 months, including 272,000 in May 2024, according to the U.S. Labor Department. The unemployment rate has been at or below 4% for 30 consecutive months, something that last occurred in the late 1960s.

All 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Communication Services, Information Technology and Financials. The worst performing sectors were Real Estate, Utilities and Consumer Staples.

Over the period, the U.S. dollar strengthened against the Canadian dollar, Japanese yen and the Euro currency, while remaining flat against the British pound.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, finished up 3.7% for the 12-month period ending June 30, 2024, as central banks paused their hiking cycles and began to reverse course. The 10-year Government of Canada yield reached its highest level in 16 years in October before falling into the year-end. 2024 saw the 10-year yield drift upwards before falling on central bank action in June. During the period the Bank of Canada (BoC) raised its policy rate by 25 basis points (bps) in July, then went on to pause rate hikes for almost twelve months before announcing a 25 bps cut in early June of 2024. This was the first rate cut by the BoC in four years. Within the U.S., the 10-year Treasury yield similarly trended upwards into October before dropping sharply. The Federal Reserve hiked rates once in July but then held its key rate steady at 5.25–5.50% for the remainder of the period.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofA Canadian and U.S. corporate indices OAS (Option-Adjusted Spread) rallied at the start of the period before widening in October amidst the crisis in the Middle East. Spreads then narrowed from November into the end of the period.

Overall, most sector allocations only saw small changes. Over the period, the allocation to Information Technology and Communication Services holdings were increased, while holdings in the Industrials and Financials sectors were lowered. Geographic and sector allocations are a by-product of the Portfolio Managers’ bottom-up investment process.

At a sector level, and on an absolute return basis, Information Technology and to a lesser extent, Financials, Communication Services, Consumer Discretionary and Industrials were the largest contributors to performance. Individual securities that were top contributors included Nvidia Corporation, Alphabet Incorporated and Microsoft Corporation. Top detractors included Estee Lauder Companies, Edwards Lifesciences Corporation and Zoetis Incorporated.

The fixed income portion of the portfolio outperformed the benchmark for the period. The Fund benefited from an overweight in aggregate credit exposure relative to the benchmark as credit spreads compressed. The Fund held an underweight in the long end of the yield curve which contributed to performance as yield rose in the third quarter of 2023 and early 2024.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$435.0 million at June 30, 2024, from \$255.2 million at June 30, 2023. This change was composed of net sales of \$103.9 million, investment performance of \$76.4 million and cash distributions of \$0.5 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or are likely to materially affect the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pays the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net

asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a "Related Broker"). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$13,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which shares of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when shareholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be

sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;

Financial Highlights

The information on the following tables is based on prescribed regulations and as a result, is not expected to add across due to the increase (decrease) in net assets from operations being based on average shares outstanding during the period and all other numbers being based on actual shares outstanding at the relevant point in time. Footnotes for the tables are found at the end of the Financial Highlights section.

- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fee

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

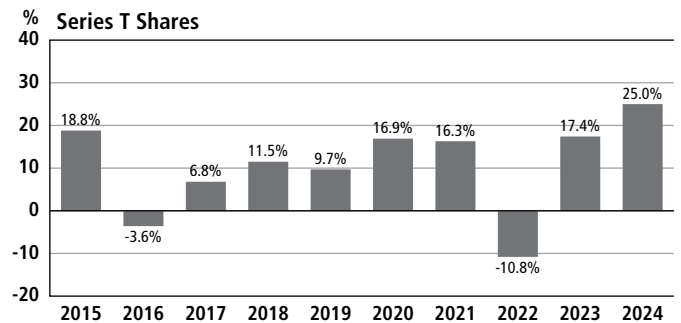
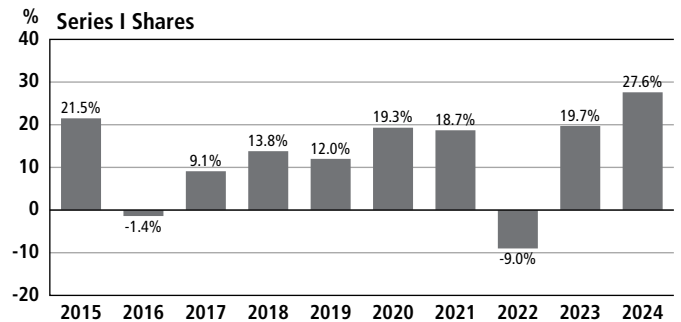
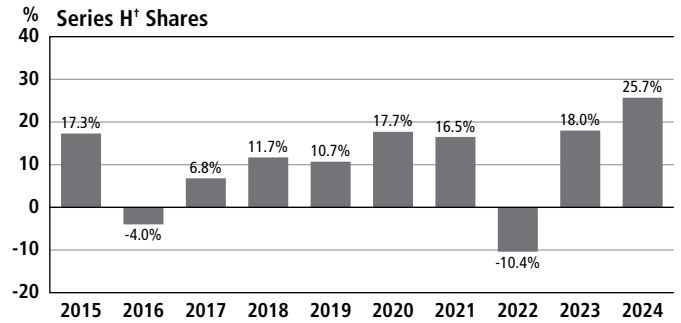
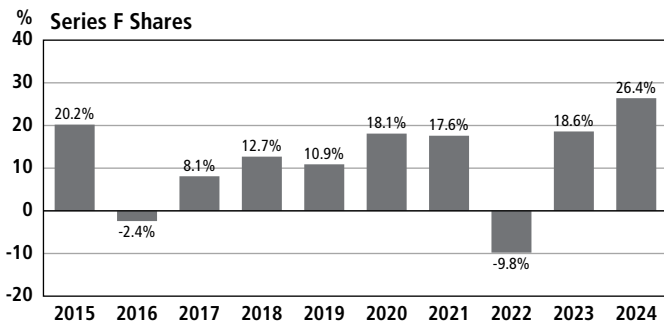
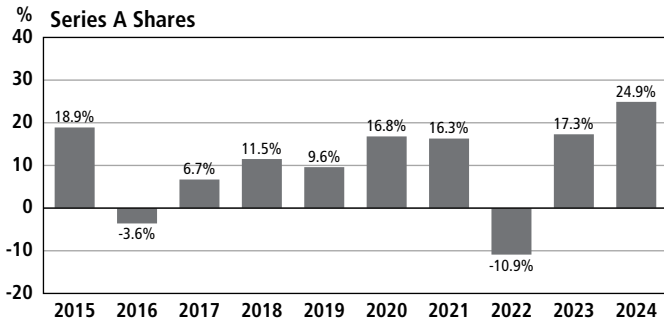

Index Descriptions

Bloomberg U.S. Government/Credit Index 1–5 yrs (C\$, Hedged) – This index measures the performance of U.S. dollar-denominated U.S. treasury bonds, government related bonds and investment grade U.S. corporate bonds that have a remaining maturity of greater than or equal to one year and less than five years.

ICE BofA U.S. Corporate & Government Master Index (C\$, Hedged) – This index tracks the performance of U.S. dollar denominated investment grade debt publicly issued in the U.S. domestic market, including U.S. Treasury, U.S. agency, foreign government, supranational and corporate securities.

S&P 500 Index (C\$) – This index is a capitalization-weighted index designed to measure the performance of the broad U.S. economy through changes in the aggregate market value of 500 stocks representing all major industries.
