The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund's investment objective is to provide total returns that have lower correlations to major stock or bond market indices in the form of income and long-term capital appreciation by investing primarily in dividend-paying or distribution-paying equity securities.

All of the Fund's objectives and strategies are further described in the simplified prospectus of the Fund.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

Results of Operations

For the year ended at June 30, 2024 (the "period"), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of 5.9%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are

applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Index, returned 12.1% during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to this broad-based index to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund’s mandate may be significantly different from the index shown.

The Fund’s blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Canadian Dividend Aristocrats Index (C\$) and 50% S&P 500 Dividend Aristocrats Index (C\$), returned 7.8% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund underperformed the blended benchmark due in part to an underweight and security selection in Industrials and security selection within the Utilities and Financials sectors.

The Canadian equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory. The first half of 2024 saw the Bank of Canada (BoC) become the first Group of Seven central bank to offer rate relief with a 25 basis point interest rate cut that brought interest rates down from 5.00% to 4.75%.

Inflation remains above the 2% target rate; the latest inflation numbers came in at 2.9% as of May 2024. BoC Governor Macklem admits that inflation remains above the 2% target but noted that inflation has declined consistently over the course of the year and current indicators point to a sustained easing of consumer prices and “monetary policy no longer needs to be as restrictive.” After launching a historic hiking cycle to combat inflation in March 2022, marking a significant shift in monetary policy in 2024 could open the door to additional cuts in the coming months.

The period witnessed equity markets generating double digits returns, while GDP growth was relatively flat, save the first quarter of 2024 posting 1.7% growth on an annualized basis. The manufacturing sector remains a sore spot as it contracted again in June, marking its 14th straight monthly contraction. The sector continued to be hindered by weak new orders and output. The interest rate cut and future anticipated cuts should spur GDP growth as it will likely incentivize more business investment and provide a tailwind for consumers as it may lower mortgage payments and increase potential disposable income.

Eight of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Energy, Consumer Staples and Financials. The worst performing sectors were Communication Services, Utilities and Real Estate. Over the period, the Canadian dollar strengthened against the Japanese yen and weakened against the U.S. dollar, British pound and the Euro currency.

The U.S. equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 28.7%. As we witnessed equity markets generate double-digits returns, the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) surprisingly kept interest rates at bay

(no change). The Federal Funds rate remained steady between 5.25% to 5.5%. This is a sharp contrast to the previous 24 months where the Fed raised rates at the fastest pace in 40 years in 2022 and 2023 to combat inflation that also rose to a four-decade high.

The Fed has taken a wait and see approach on reducing interest rates. The basis for this stance is that inflation remains stubbornly above the Fed’s 2% target inflation rate. As of May 31, 2024, the inflation rate came in at 3.3%. Over the preceding twelve months inflation has hovered within the 3.0% to 3.7% range.

The Fed is especially wary of cutting too soon after seeing an unexpected rise in inflation earlier this year from 3.1% in January to 3.5% in March. The Fed is trying to balance the risk of cutting rates too soon and allowing inflation to persist. This has left the Fed in something of a holding pattern, where policymakers are looking for several more months of benign inflation readings before deciding on cutting interest rates.

As interest rates remain at the highest levels since 2001, U.S. economic growth endures – steady hiring continues to fuel consumer spending and, in turn, an economic expansion unlike any the U.S. has seen. Employers added 2.75 million jobs over the last 12 months, including 272,000 in May 2024, according to the U.S. Labor Department. The unemployment rate has been at or below 4% for 30 consecutive months, something that last occurred in the late 1960s.

All 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Communication Services, Information Technology and Financials. The worst performing sectors were Real Estate, Utilities and Consumer Staples. Over the period, the U.S. dollar strengthened against the Canadian dollar, Japanese yen and the Euro currency, while remaining flat against the British pound.

The portfolio invests in a diversified portfolio of quality, income-generating companies from within a broad universe to generate a stable monthly income stream for investors in retirement or pre-retirement. At the end of the period the Fund’s largest allocations were in Canada and the U.S with a smaller allotment in Europe. The weighting to Canada was increased as the U.S. and Europe (by eliminating an exposure to the U.K.) were reduced. The allocation to freely tradeable cash was lowered. Both Canada and the U.S. were positive contributors to returns, with Canada having a greater impact on performance.

The Fund’s asset mix continued to invest primarily in Canadian equities with the weighting increasing over the period while U.S. equities were lowered, and foreign equities eliminated. In the alternatives component the exposure to LRCNs (Limited Recourse Capital Notes)/Institutional Preferreds, which offer attractive yields, Business Development Companies, options writing and private capital rose. Holdings in closed-end funds/ETFs were reduced, mortgage REITS were maintained and preferred shares were sold from the portfolio. The sector allocation within the Fund is diversified, with Energy, Financials and Real Estate representing the top weightings. Sectors changes made included increases to Energy, Communications Services and Health Care while Real Estate, Consumer Staples and Industrials were

decreased. Financials, Energy and Health Care were the top contributors to performance with Utilities and Communication Services detractors at the sector level. Partial currency hedging undertaken was also a small detractor. Holdings in LRCNs/ Institutional Preferreds and Dynamic Short Term Credit PLUS Fund had a positive impact on returns. Individual securities that were the top contributors included Sienna Senior Living and Royal Bank of Canada. Positions in NextEra Energy Partners and BCE detracted from performance.

The Fund's net asset value decreased to \$178.9 million at June 30, 2024, from \$219.1 million at June 30, 2023. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$45.4 million, cash distributions of \$7.9 million and investment performance of \$13.1 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity, changes in the Fund's income earning investments and reductions in management fees.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

Risk Rating Change

Effective December 4, 2023, the risk rating of the Fund has been changed from low-to-medium to medium. This change is in accordance with the Risk Classification Methodology mandated by the Canadian Securities Administrators. There are no changes to the investment objective or strategies of the Fund associated with the new risk rating.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pays the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Related Brokerage Commissions

From time to time, the Fund may enter into portfolio securities transactions with Scotia Capital Inc. or other related dealers in whom Scotiabank has a significant interest (a "Related Broker"). These Related Brokers may earn commission or spreads on such transactions, which are made on terms and conditions that are comparable to transactions made with non-related brokers.

During the period, the Fund paid \$6,000 in commissions to Related Brokers.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a

foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended.

Financial Highlights

The following tables show selected key financial information about each series of the Fund and are intended to help you understand the Fund’s financial performance for the periods indicated. The information on the following tables is based on prescribed regulations and as a result, is not expected to add across due to the increase (decrease) in net assets from operations being based on average units outstanding during the period and all other numbers being based on actual units outstanding at the relevant point in time. Footnotes for the tables are found at the end of the Financial Highlights section.

Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager’s written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fee

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

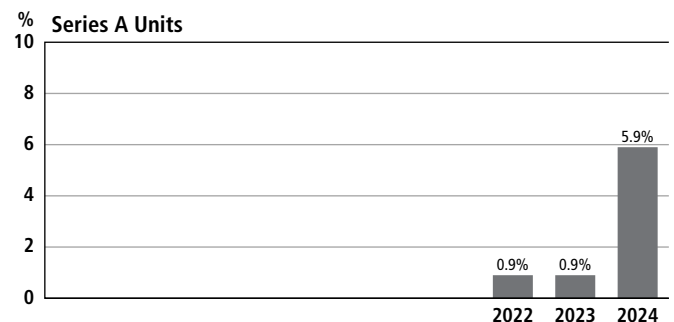

Index Descriptions

S&P 500 Dividend Aristocrats Index (C\$) – This index measures the performance of large cap, blue chip companies within the S&P 500 that have followed a policy of increasing dividends every year for at least 25 consecutive years.

S&P/TSX Canadian Dividend Aristocrats Index (C\$) – This index measures the performance of companies included in the S&P Canada BMI that have followed a policy of consistently increasing dividends every year for at least five years. Index constituents are weighted according to their indicated yield as of the last trading date in November.

S&P/TSX Composite Index – This is a broad economic sector index comprising approximately 95% of the market capitalization for Canadian-based, Toronto Stock Exchange listed companies.
